
The royalty was entertained with skits presented by the student body.




Fifteen seniors took part in the play along with several other class members helping to make the play complete. Mr. Joachim directed the seniors play this









Seven to Regionals, One to State




Instrumental lessons and music are also taught at the school in various conference rooms and group music in the large room located near the entry. Mr. Saugstad is the grade school principal.






















Seniors Make Their Last Year the Best






