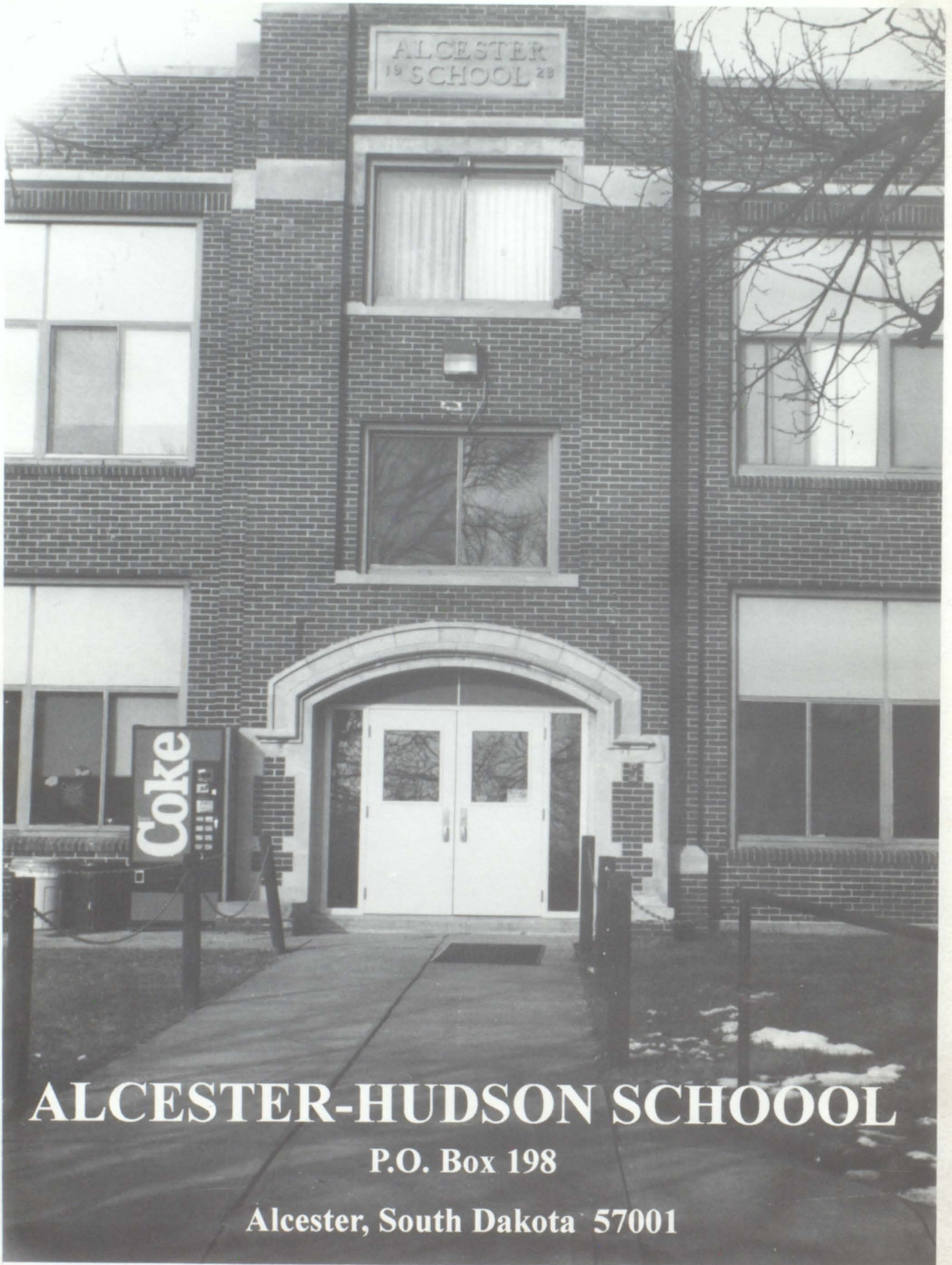




In Memory of Mr. Robert Carlson

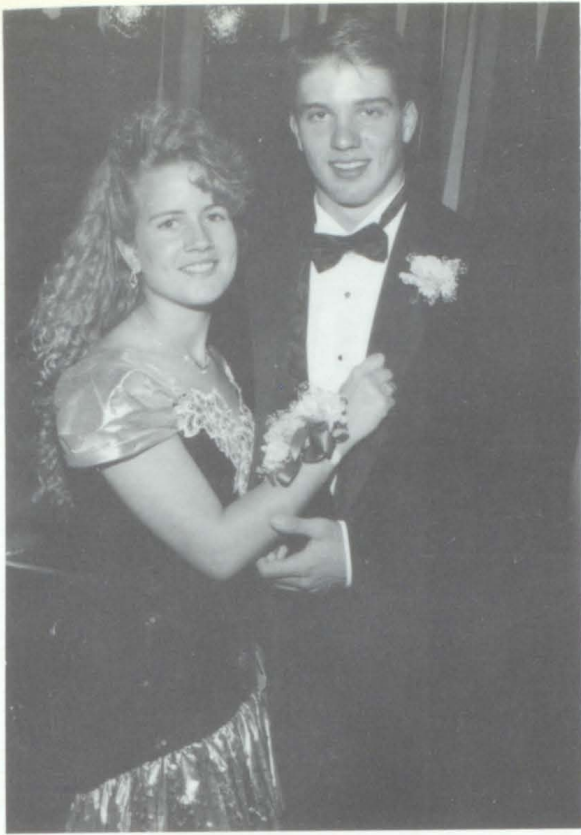


"What Might Have Been"

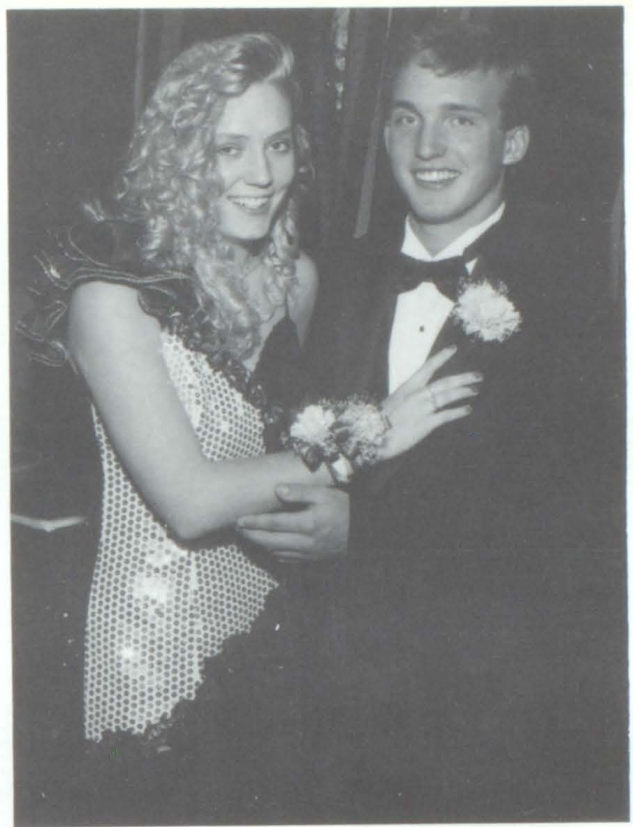

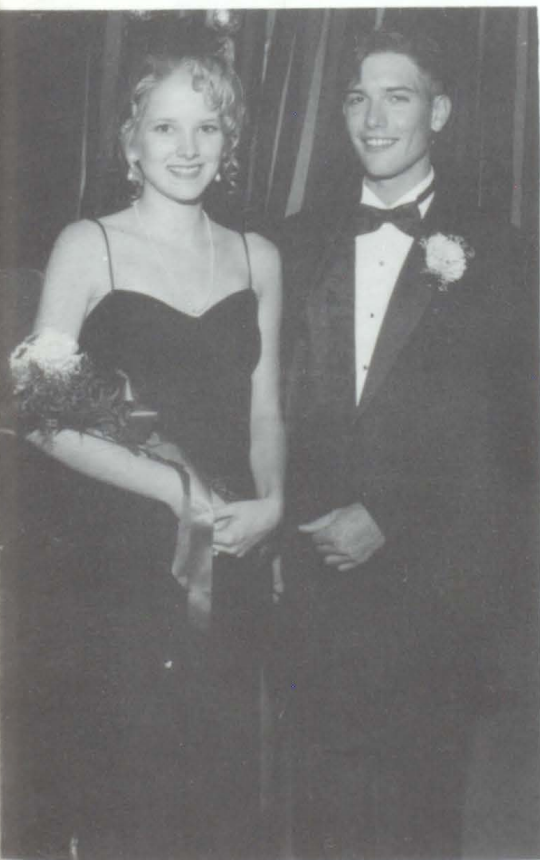

"Miss You in a Heartbeat"



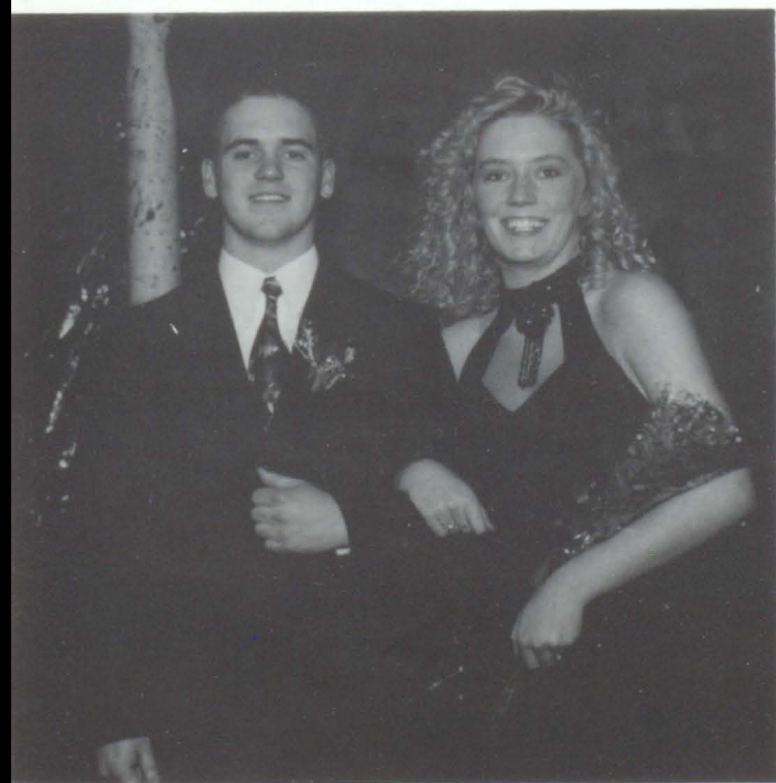

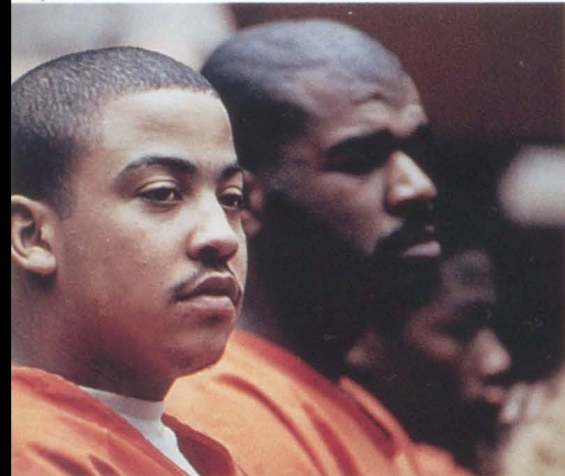

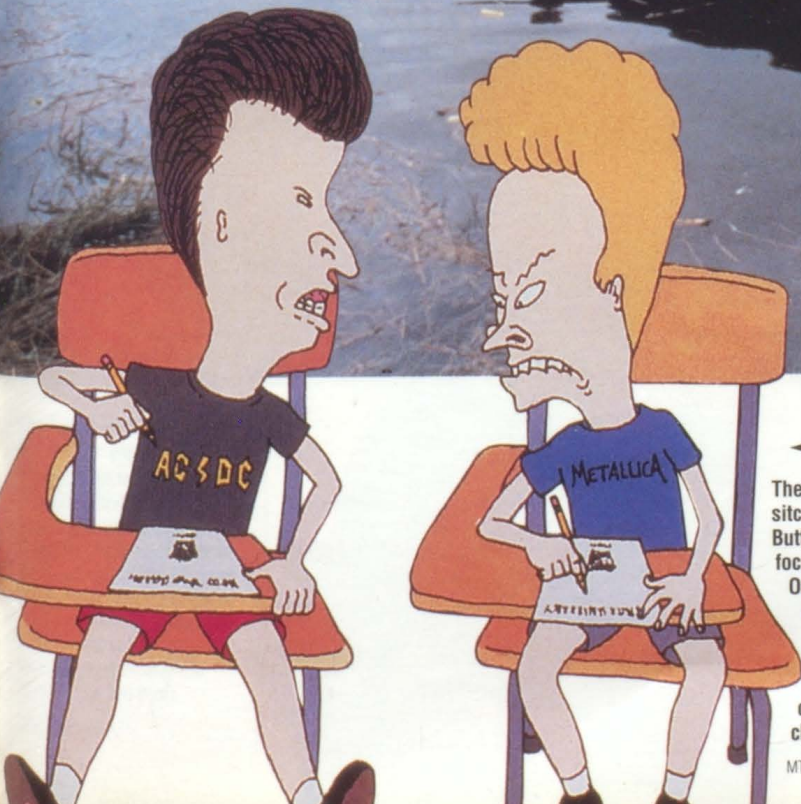
