Our Region has 14 teams, the top 20 runners and top 3 teams automatically qualify for the state meet. Alcester-Hudson finished 3rd in our Region behind Lennox and Vermillion to again qualify for state. Kim Ronning was Alcester-Hudson's leading runner much of the year followed by

Jennah Homandberg, Danie Feekes, and Amy Larsen while Marinn Dubs placed well in the J.V. races. With a young group of runners, the girls are looking for another good year in 1999.

The Boys Cross Country team was also Fickbohm being the only seniors. This year's Class A Boys Region was very strong. This made it very difficult for the young squad of sophomores to move up to the Varsity from J.V. which increases the distance from 3K to 5K.
















The Cubs also recorded victories over West Sioux, Parker, and Scotland. Losses were suffered to three playoff team: Canton, Beresford, and Harrisburg along with Dakota Valley.

Team awards went to senior Eric Haugland, MVP and Most Valuable Offense; Adam St. Pierre, Most Valuable Defense and sophomore John Haverhals, Most Improved.



























The 1998-99 Alcester-Hudson Wrestling Team faced much adverstiy as a young inexperienced squad. Since last season the team increased in numbers, recorded 2 dual meet victories, and gained a lot of valuable experience. The 16-member squad, which included only 3 upperclassmen, was led by Senior John Gates at 130 pounds and Sophomore Jared Barnes at 125 pounds. The Cubs' two dual meet wins came against Chester and Beresford. The Cubs also had a strong showing in the West Sioux Invitational Tournament, placing 7 wrestlers. In the Big Sioux Conference Tourney Jared Barnes placed first and Justin Winquist at 189 pounds placed third. In the District Tournament Bryan Burt placed 3rd at 112 pounds, Jon Burt placed 4th at 119 pounds, Jared Barnes placed 1st, John Gates placed fourth, and Justin Winquist placed 4th also. Because the Cubs placed 5 wrestlers in the top 4, they qualified for the Region Tournament. In Regions Jared Barnes again took 1st, making him the lone qualifier for the State Tournament in Aberdeen. Jared capped off an outstanding season suffering his only loss in the state championship final round by an 8-6 decision, placing him 2nd at 125 in Class B.


