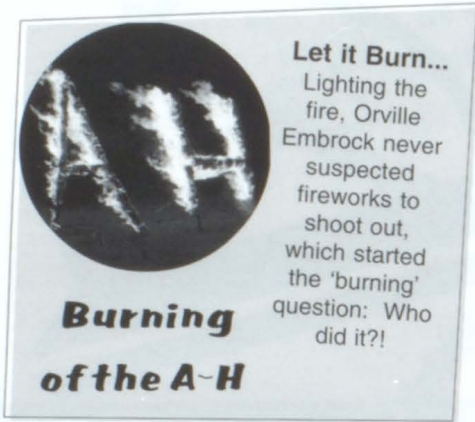


CORONATION

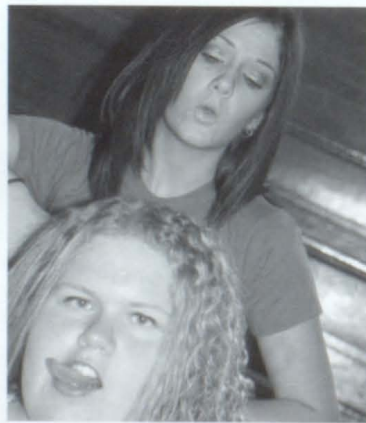

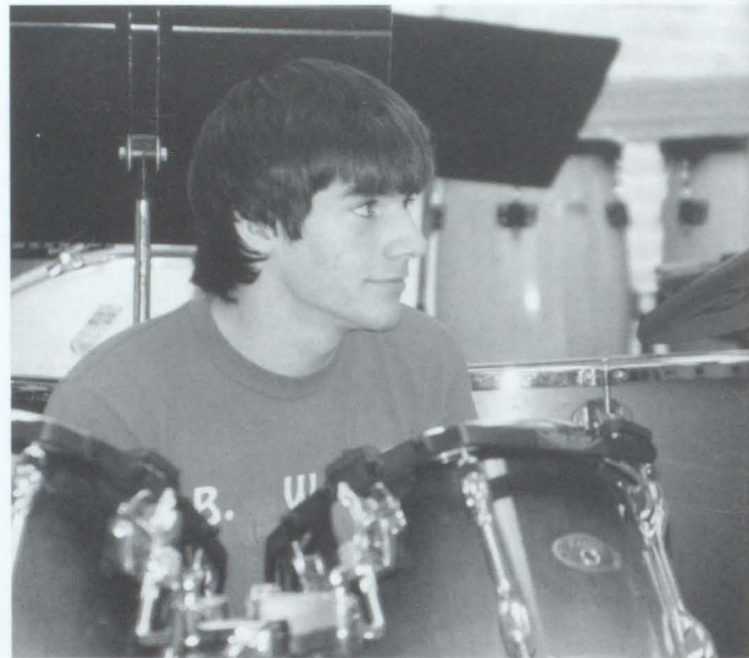

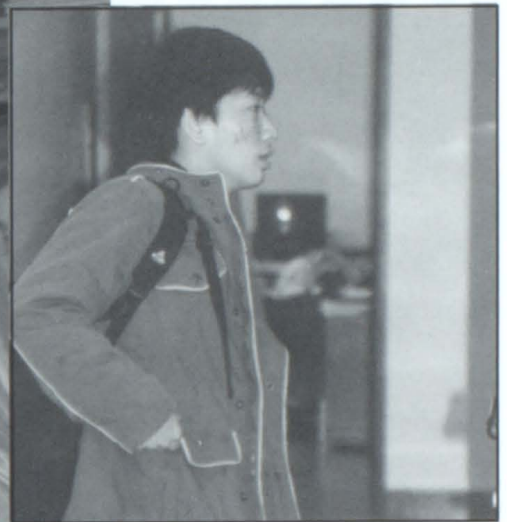

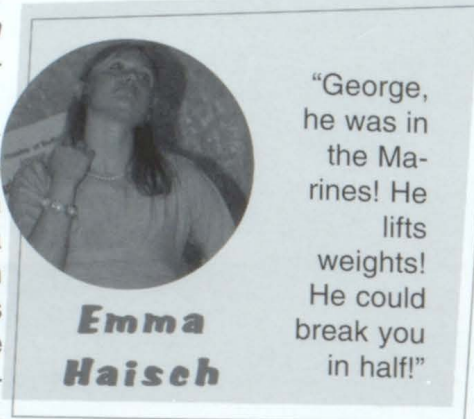
They were joined by Kolbe Nelson as Paul, Emma

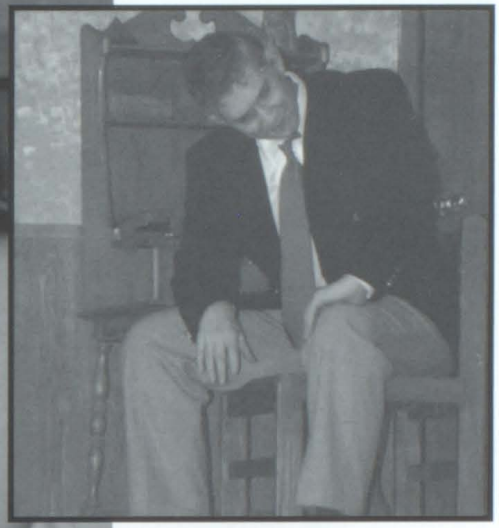

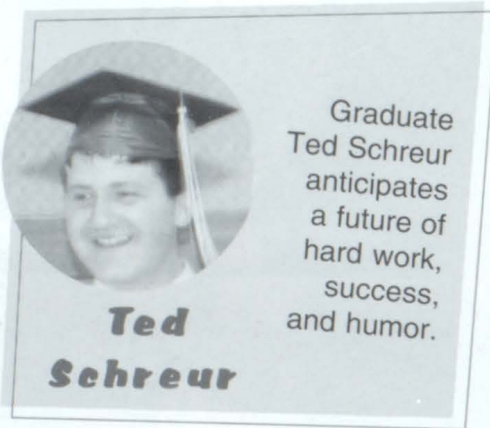

Students were busy all year round, not only with academics and athletics but also with jobs.

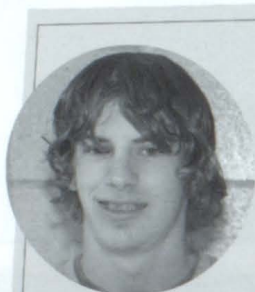
In a survey taken of 89 AHHS students, 58% have part-time jobs and 42% do not.

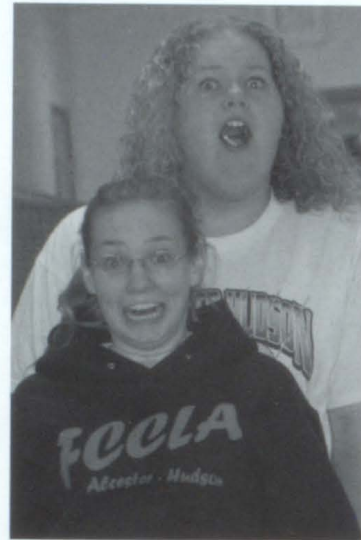
"Paws"ing for a good grade

Alcester-Hudson has

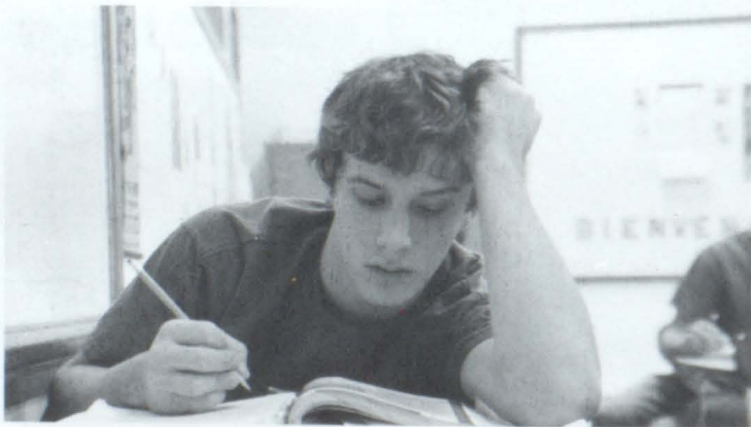

ties snapping pictures. "I enjoy doing Channel 45 because I love taking pictures and letting the community see what is going on in town and at school events."

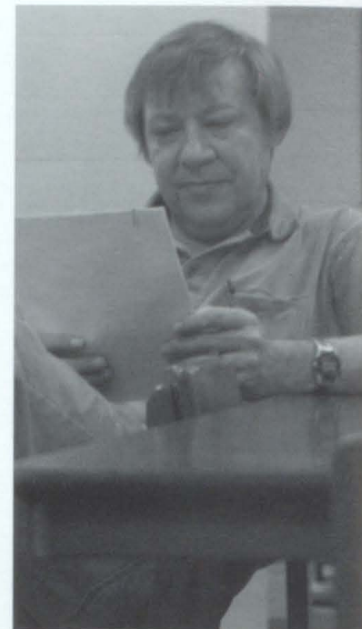

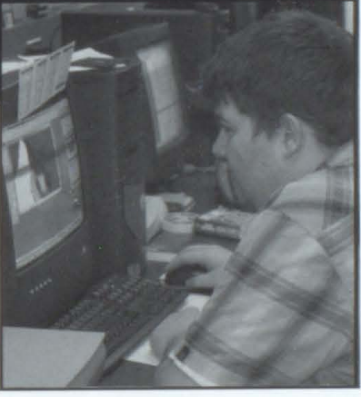

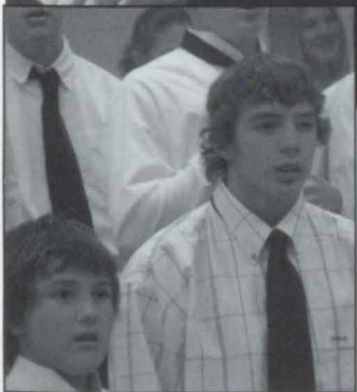

The team worked hard and did many performances including the local competition where one

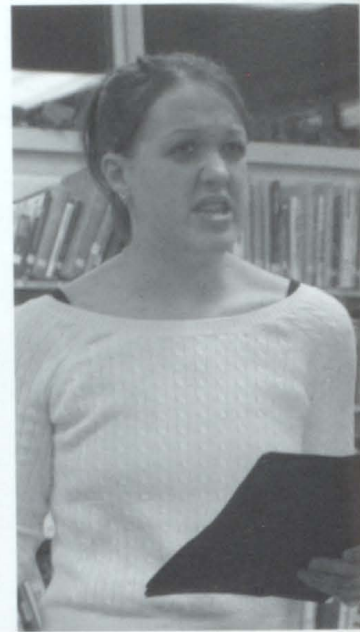

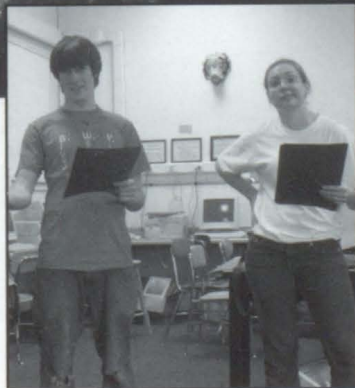

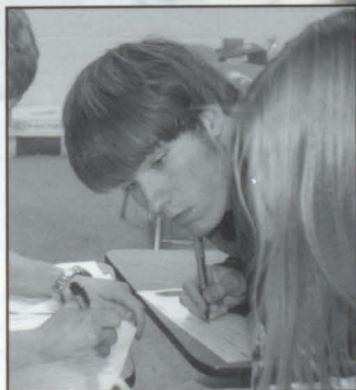

With so much going on this year, the AHHS staff has



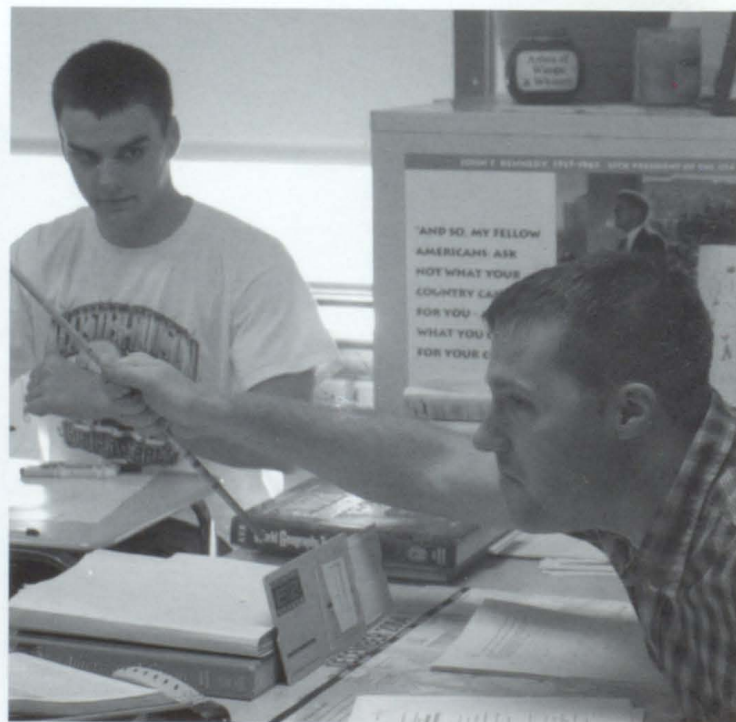

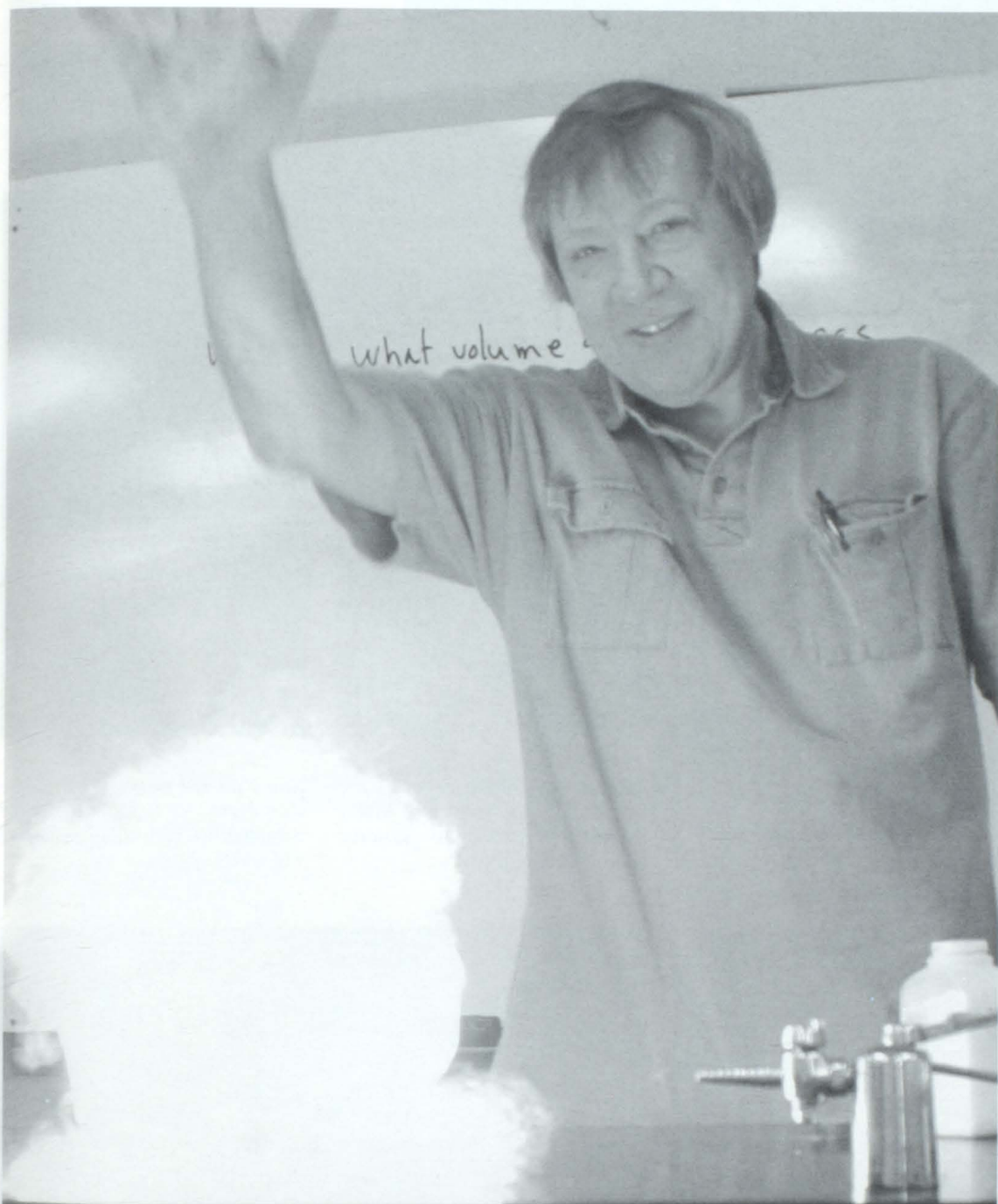

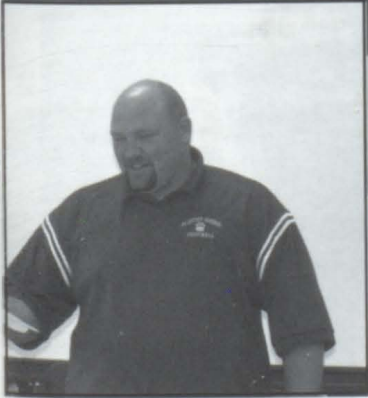

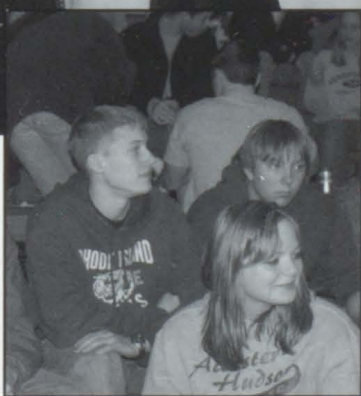

The team had two individuals make it to state, Adam Scott and Corey Haisch. Scott placed 66th and Haisch placed 102nd.

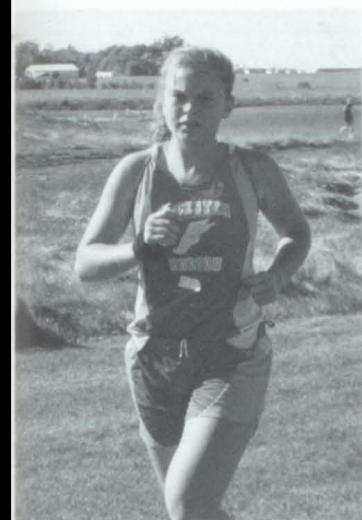

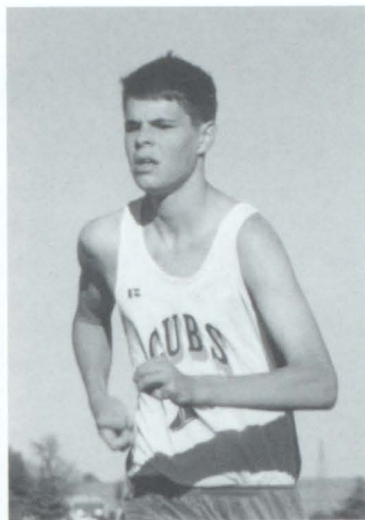

But "elated" is the only word that captures the feeling of making it to the division playoffs for the first time since 1998.

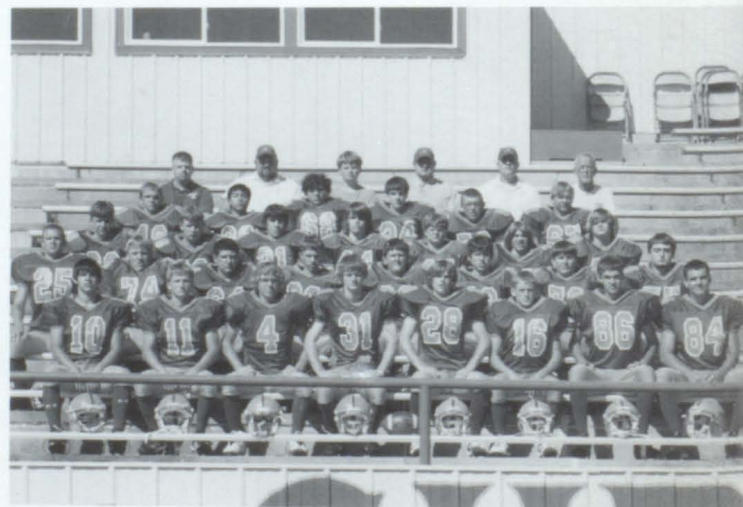

"I really enjoy coaching this team. They work so hard and are very dedicated, and in the end it will pay off whether they believe me or not." stated Head coach Phil Serck.

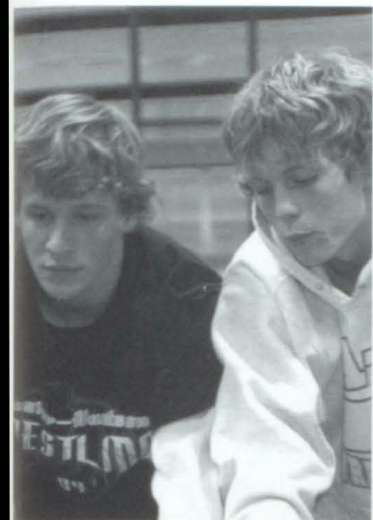
