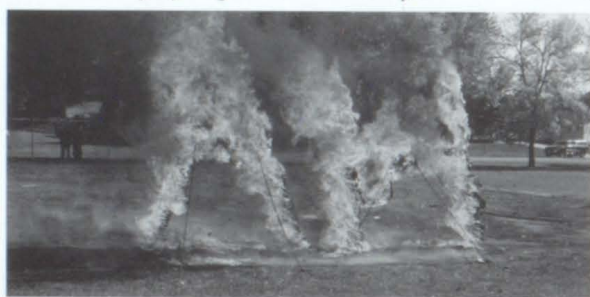
Pride and Paws

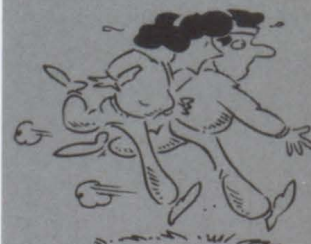

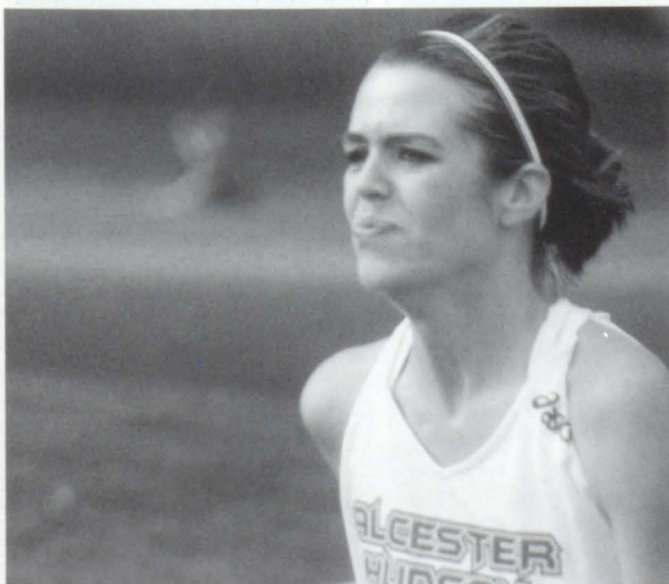

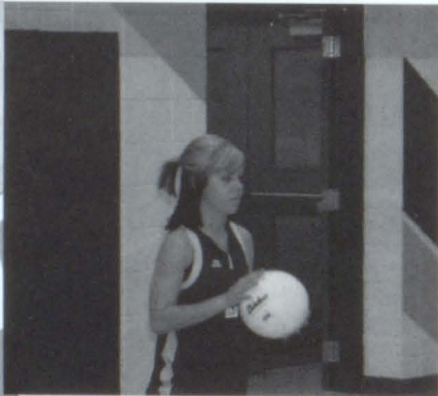


[Volleyball]

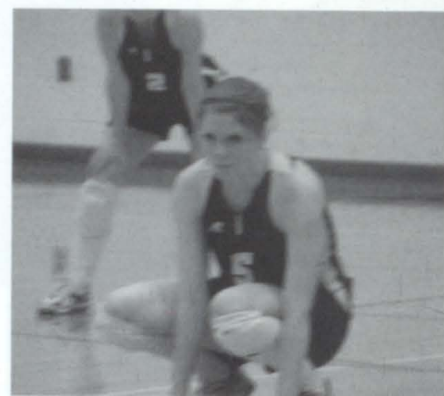

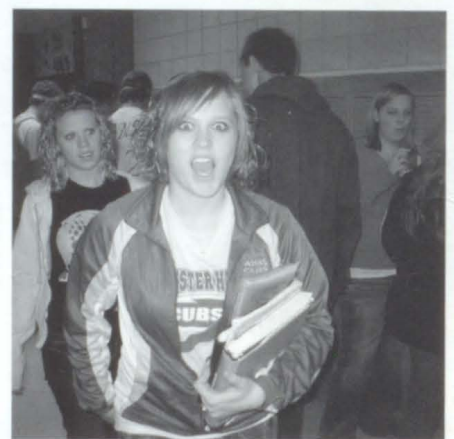

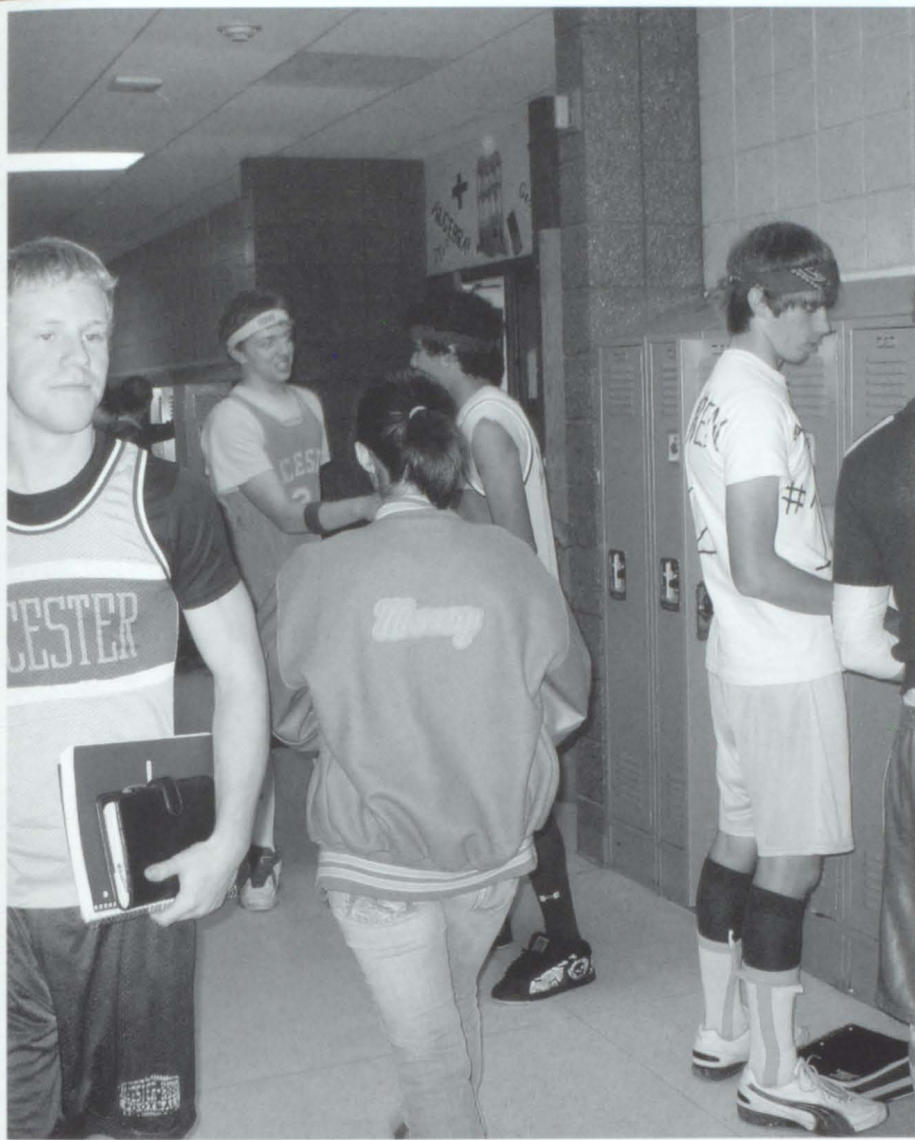

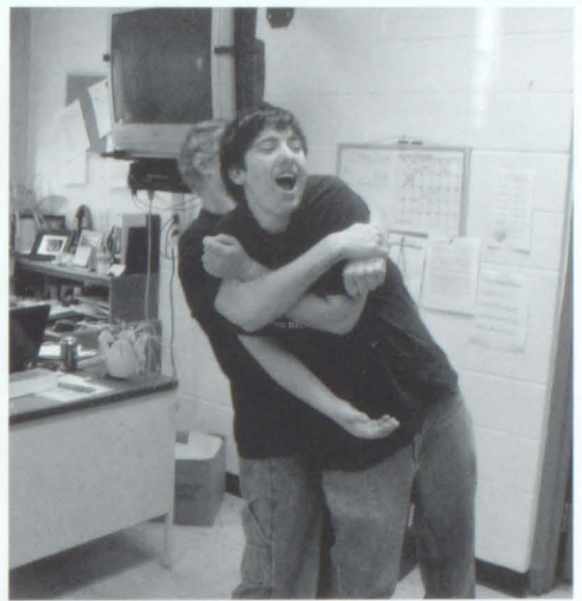

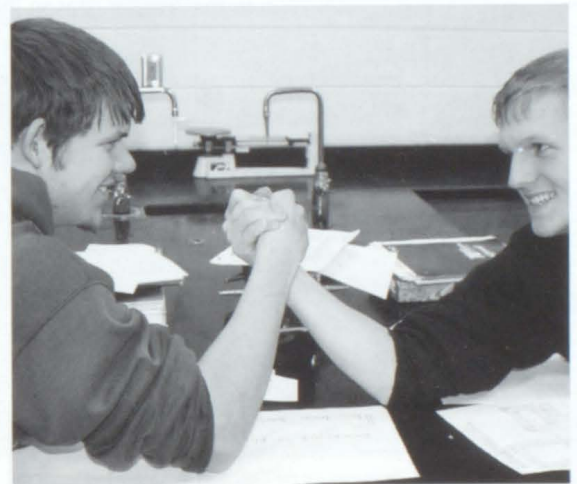

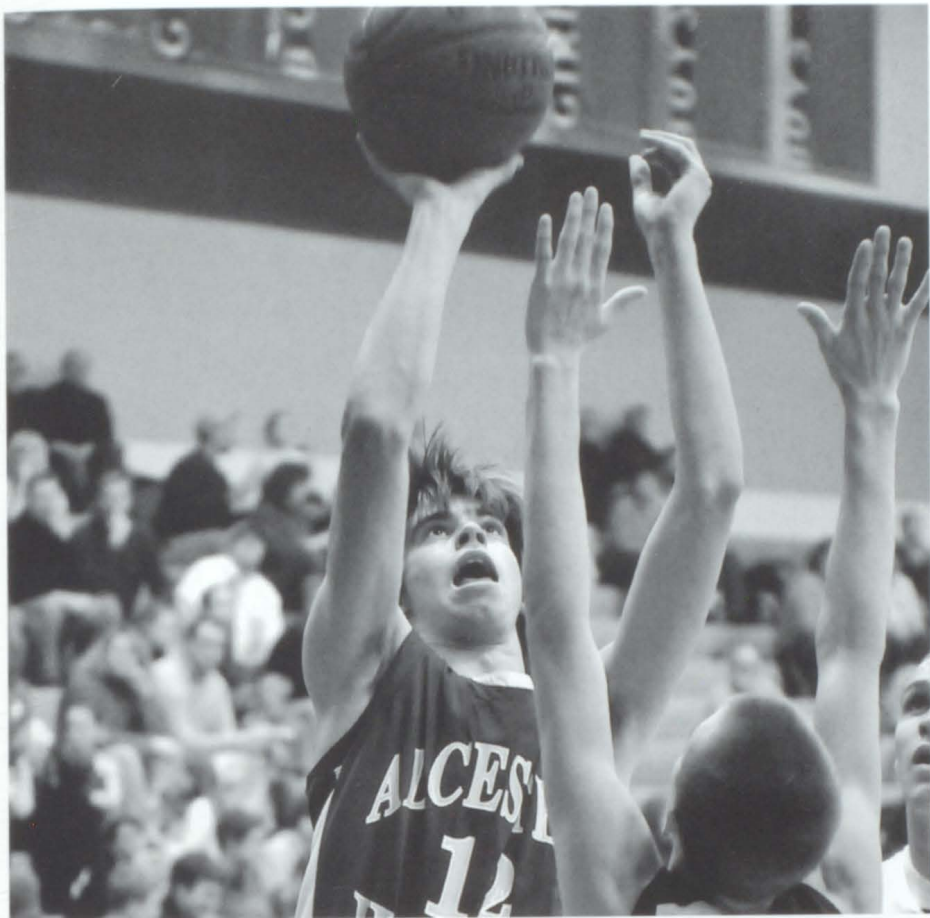

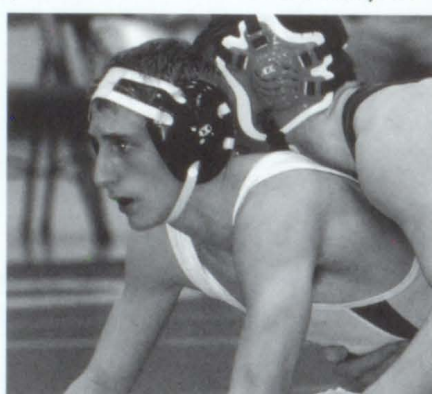
A Series of Painful Events

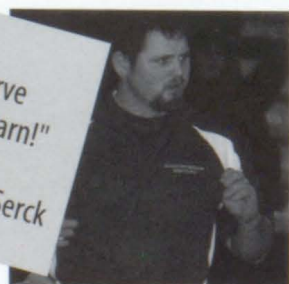

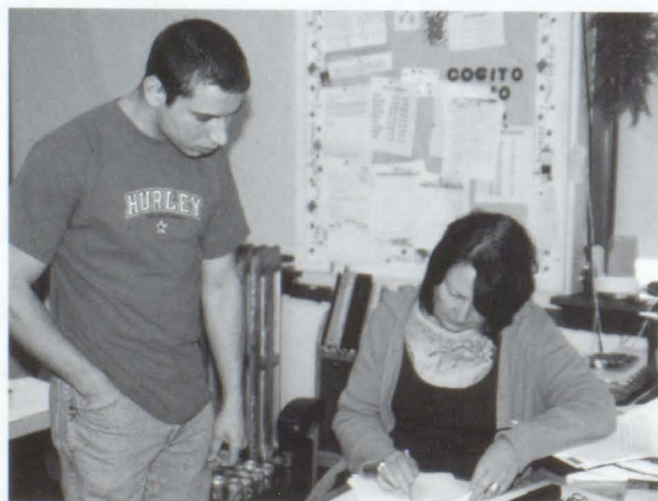
The Insiders

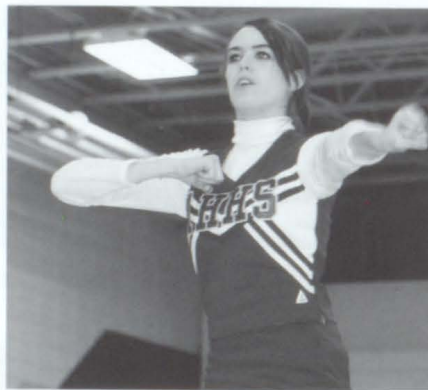
The Girl Who Owned the Pom Poms

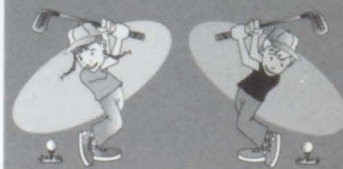

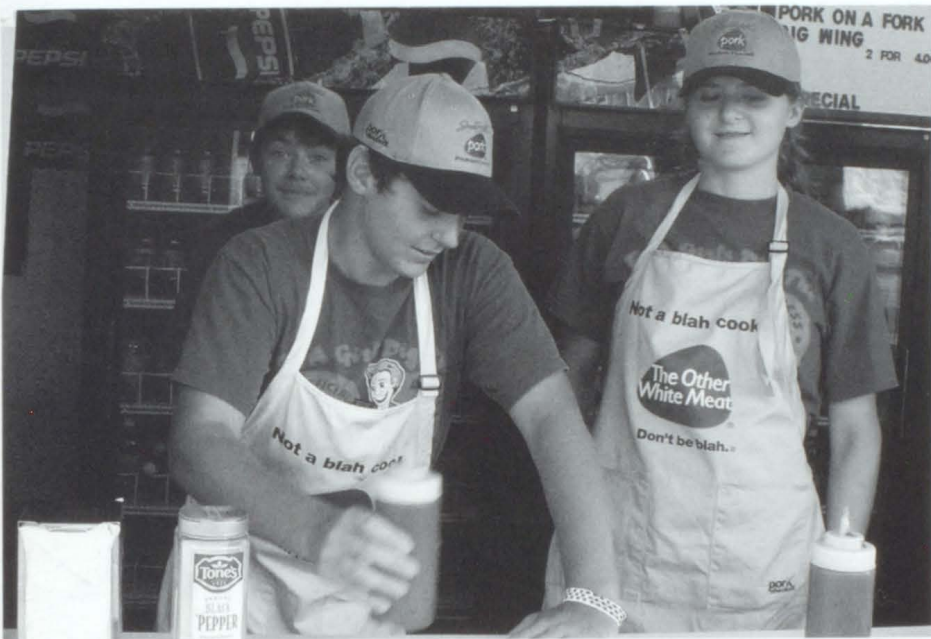

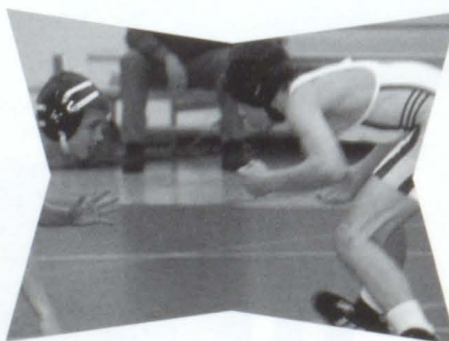

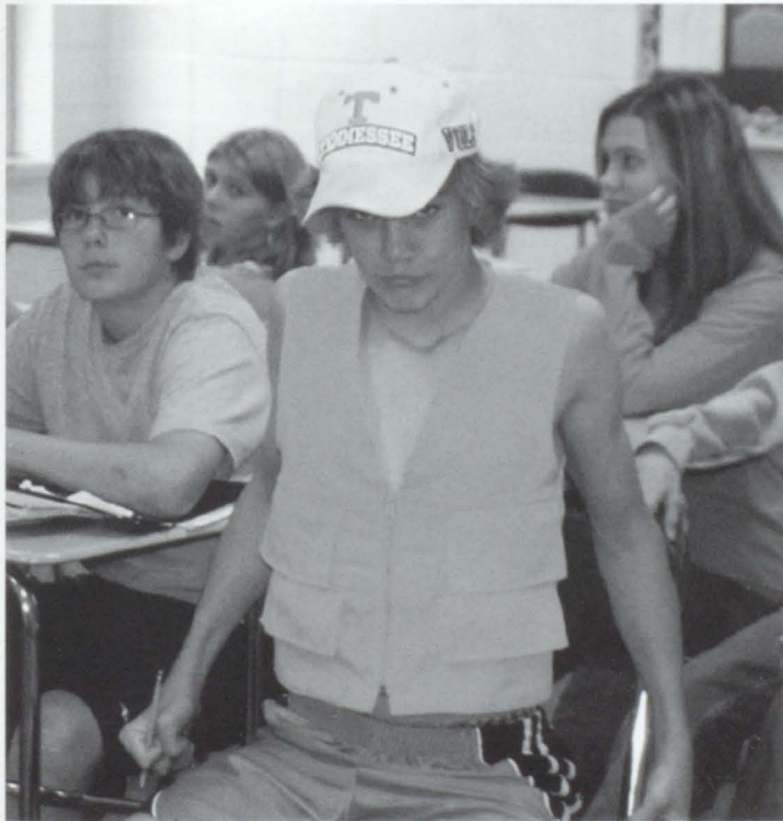

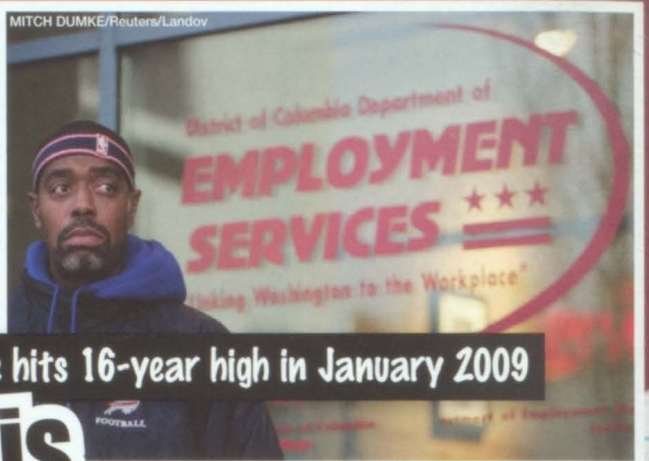

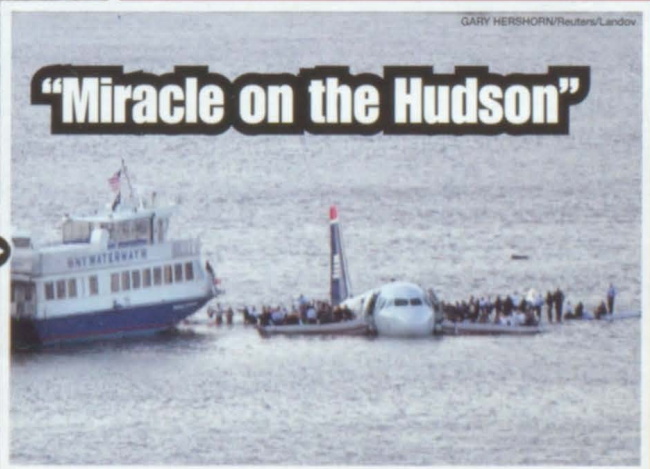
