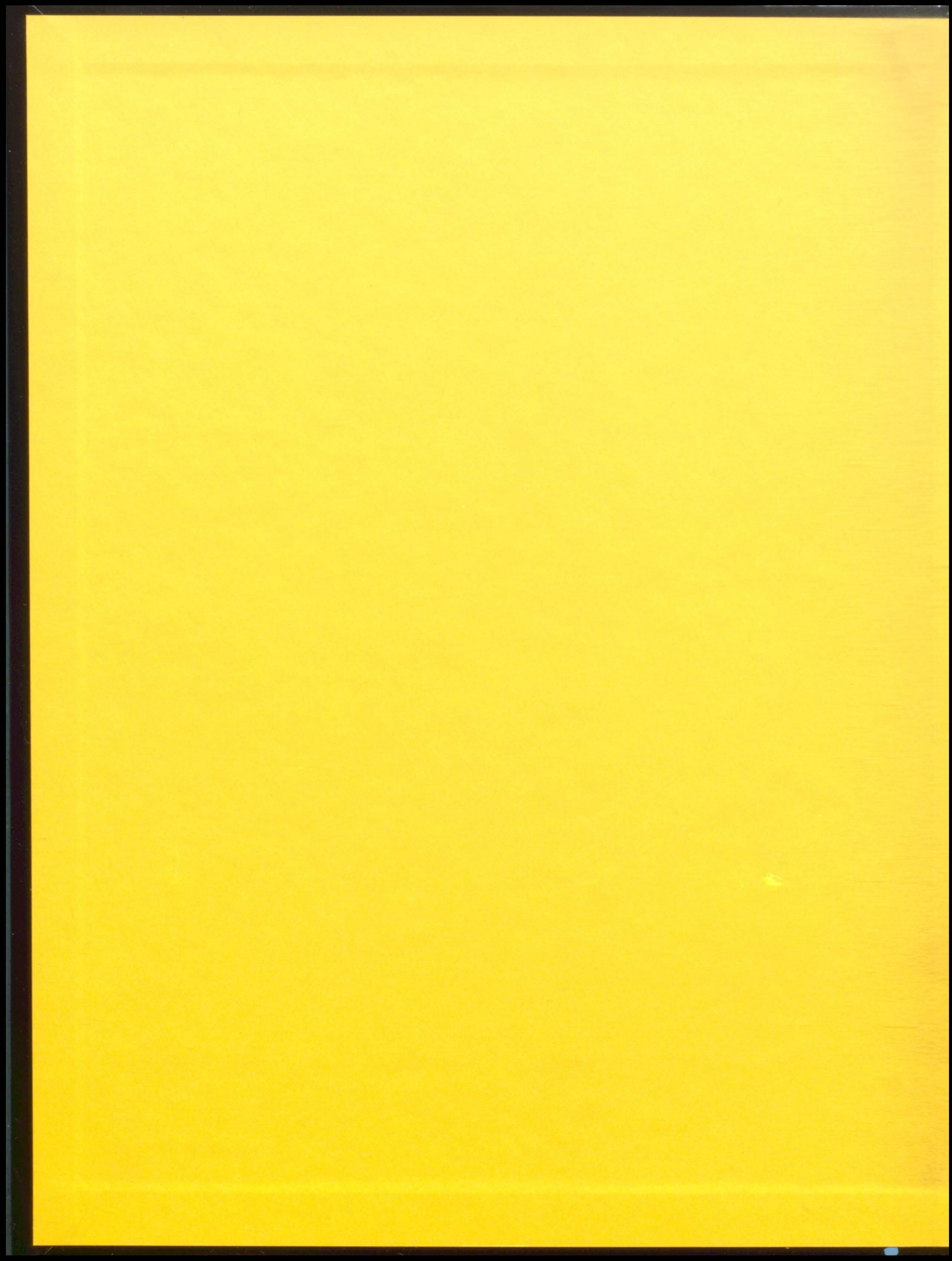
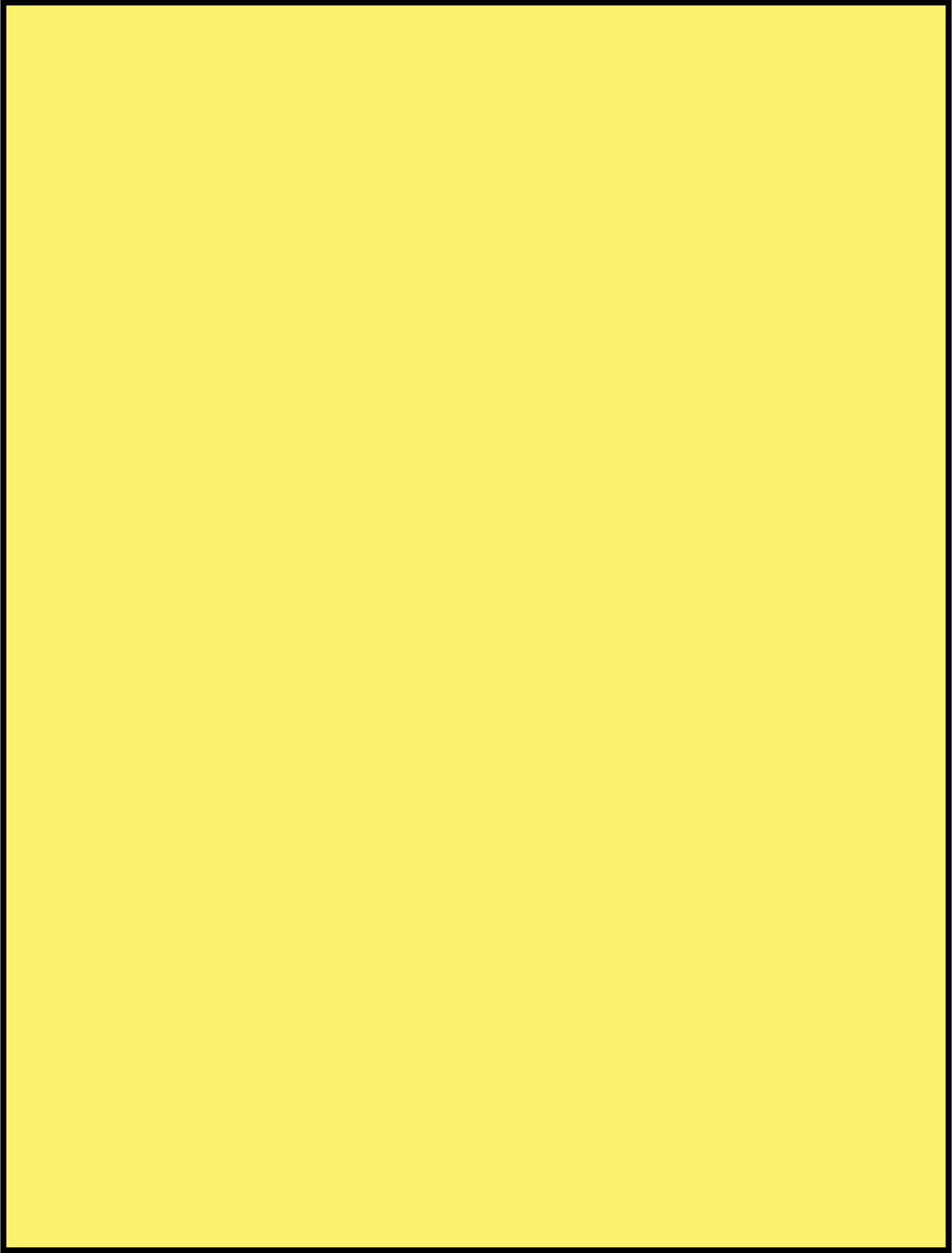
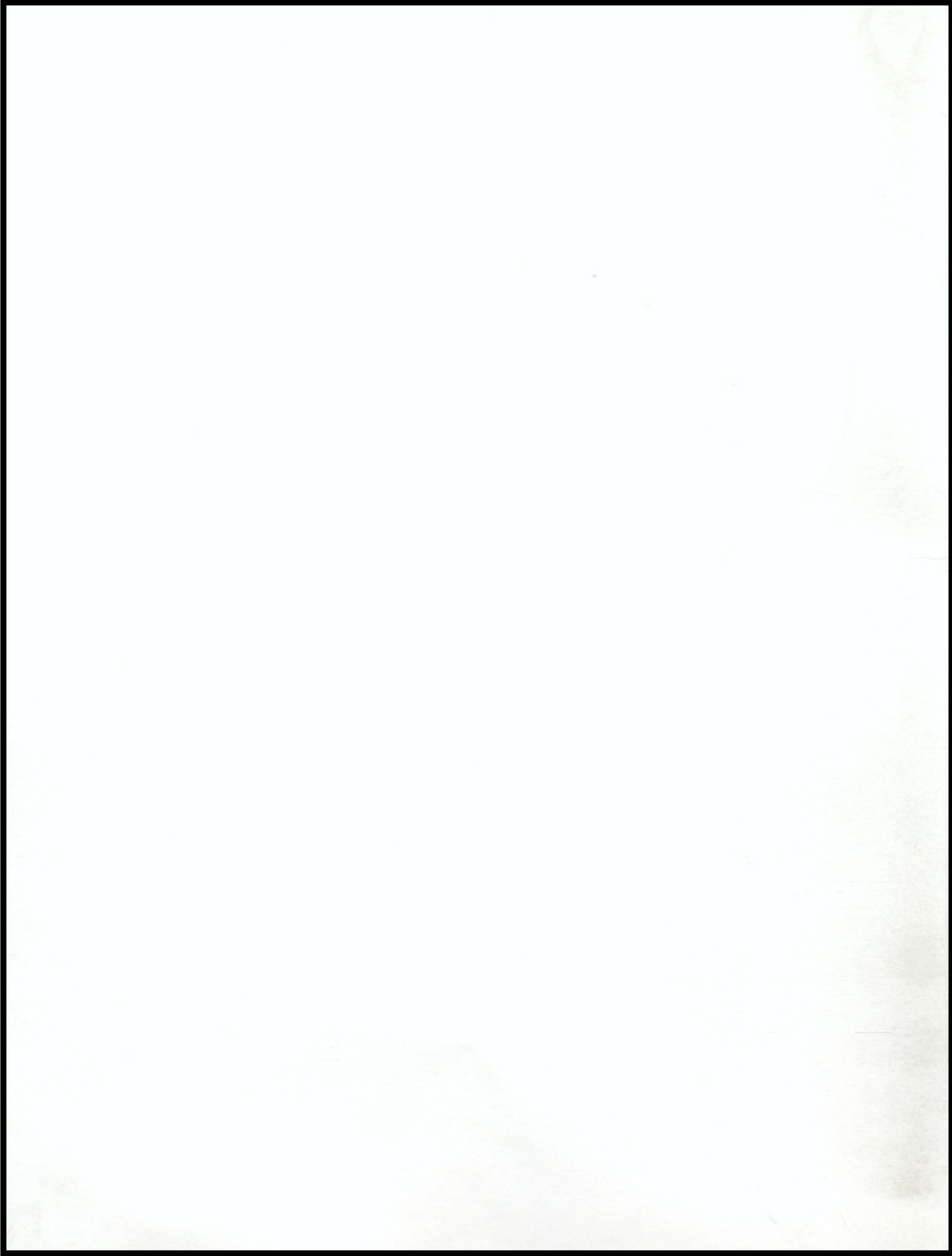

This year we are the **ones.**

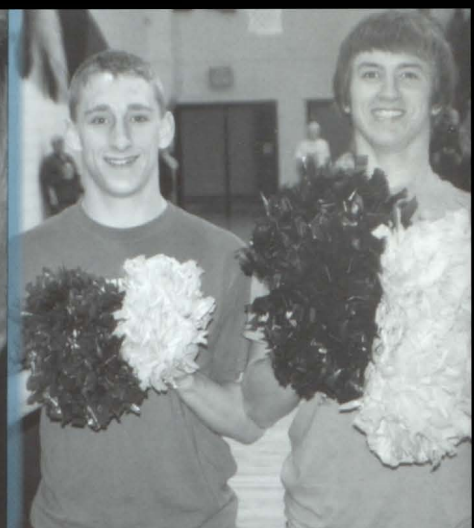

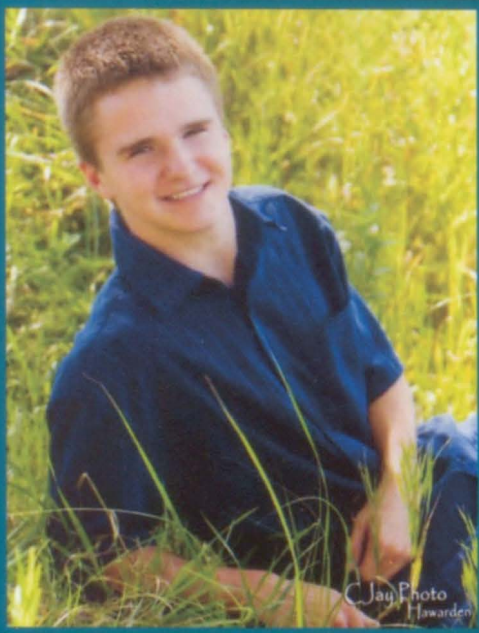
Garret Beeck

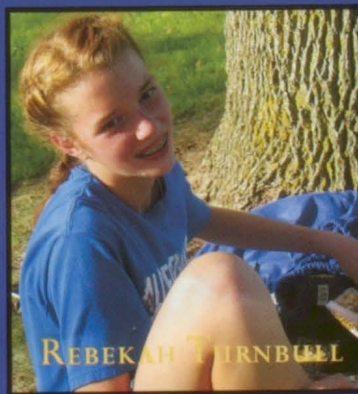
State qualifiers were Berg, Liston, Schoellerman, Fuchs, and Homandberg. Schoellerman placed seventh.



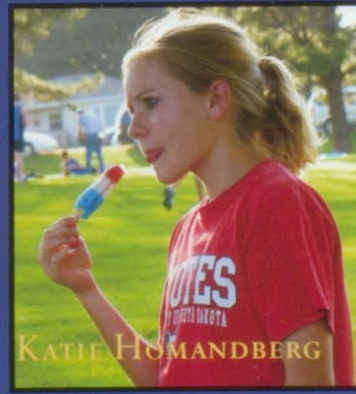

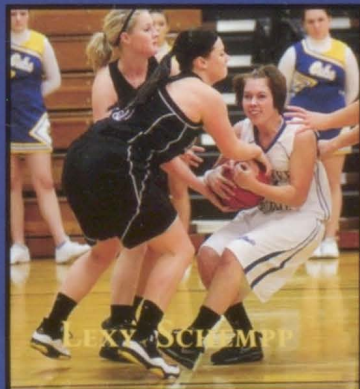
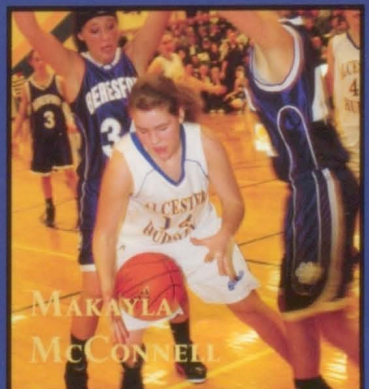
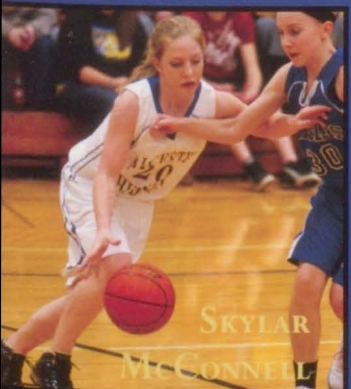
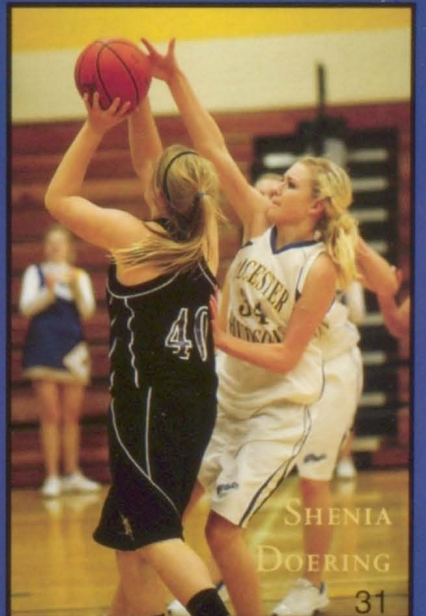


The Cubs basketball team began the 2010-2011 season aggressively. After one loss, the girls went on a winning streak, defeating five of their opponents consecutively.

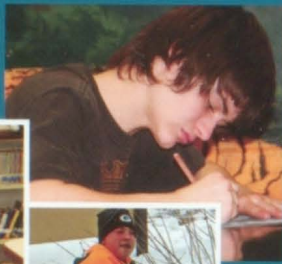

The animal science students incubated their eggs and hatched them into fuzzy little chicks. The seniors went to a Shakespearean play and enjoyed the free day, I mean the play.

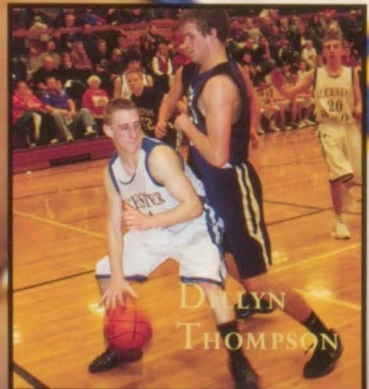
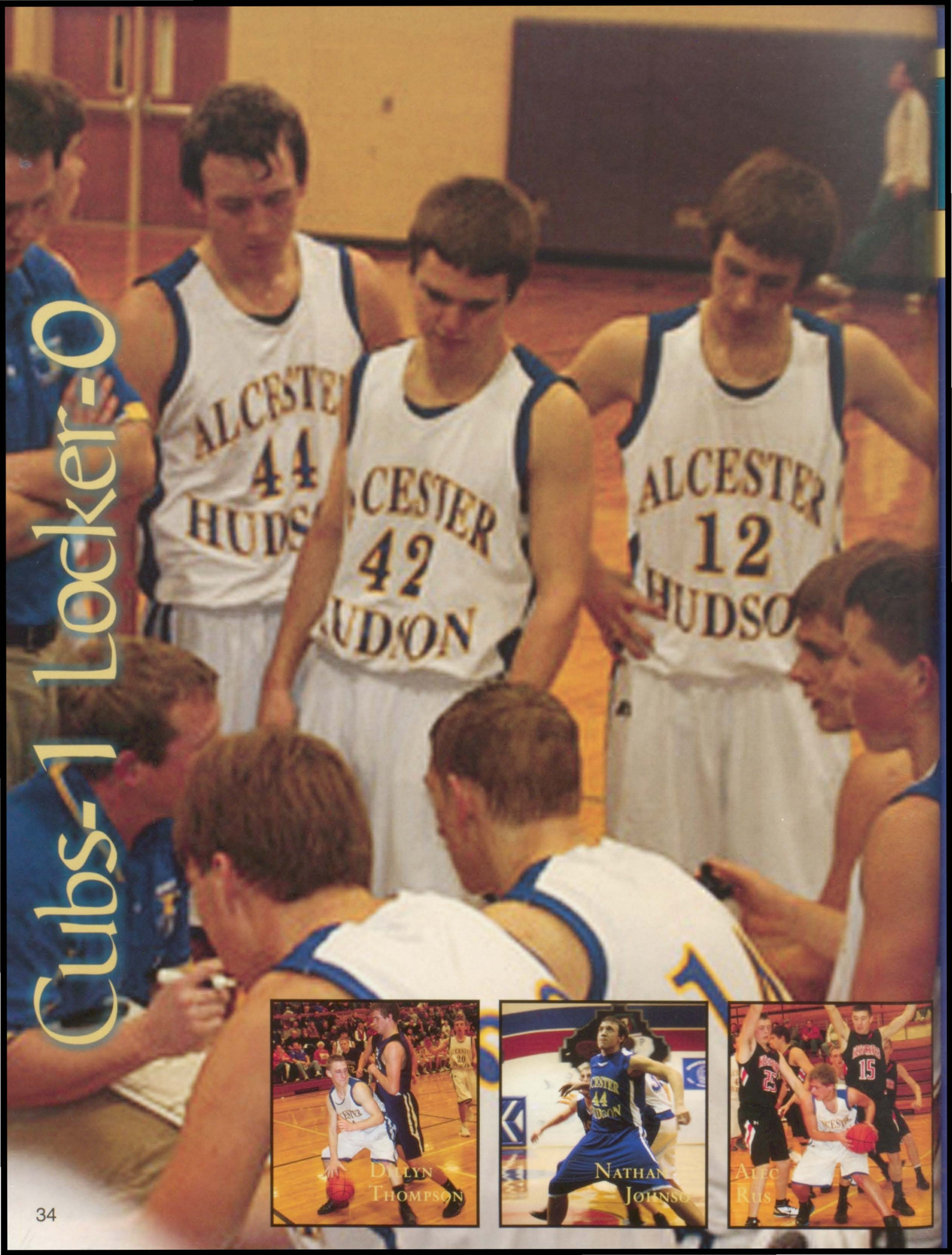

The team ended up with the regular season record of four wins and fifteen losses. With Districts right around the corner the boys tried to keep themselves focused on and off the court.

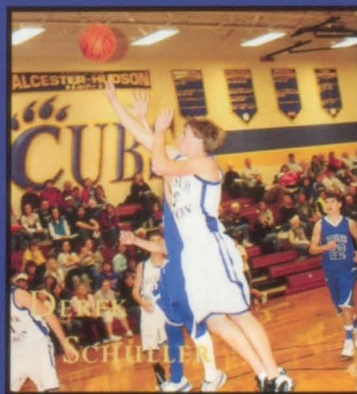

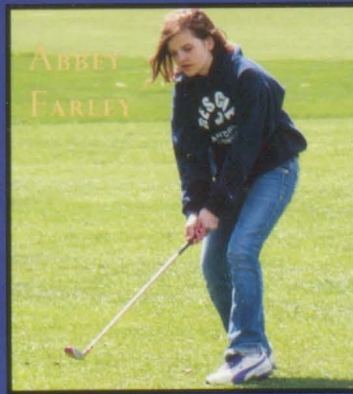
Seasoned vet Nathan Johnson competed for the first time at State in 2010 and finished his senior year again competing at State in 2011.

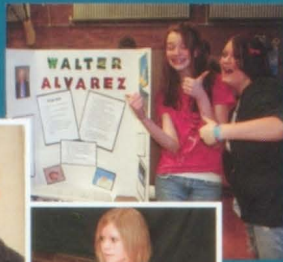

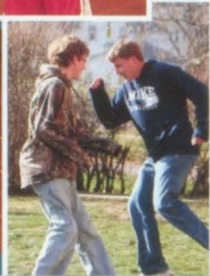

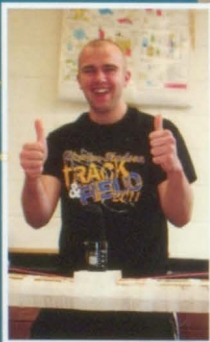

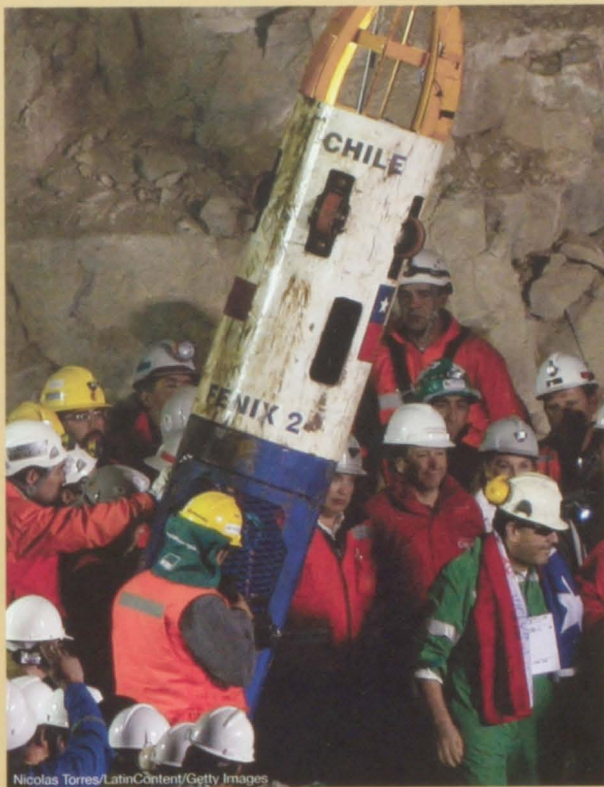
